The following modifications have been proposed to our AA in Pre-Business Administration. Please see the shaded areas in the attached degree for specific changes.

1. Under Writing and Speaking, allow students the option of taking either ENGL 219 or ENGL 220.

2. Under Mathematics and Statistics, add the clause that prohibits students from taking lower level math classes for credit towards the degree.

## Associate of Arts in Pre-Business Administration

About the Program<br>This degree program is designed to introduce students to the field of Business Administration/Management and to provide the first two years of the Bachelor of Business Administration program offered by the Robert O. Anderson Schools of Management at UNM Albuquerque Campus. All of the required courses for this associate degree program transfer to that BBA program, and students will be admitted to junior status if the following conditions are met:<br>- the student has a 2.0 cumulative GPA overall (see \#1 below)<br>- the student has a minimum grade of C (not C-) in each course listed under the Specific Requirements shown in pre-admission course work<br>- there are no waivers or substitutions in the printed curriculum of the Associate of Arts in PreBusiness Administration<br>- the student is eligible to enroll at UNM Albuquerque
