Justification

Program Justification

The proposed Minor in Public Service is an interdisciplinary minor that aims to provide undergraduate students a strong foundation in public administration and public service scholarship and related skills and to serve as a bridge between academic investigations of public administration/service to careers in public service inclusive of public, non-profit, and related private sector opportunities. While this minor will prepare students to contribute to public service in all contexts (local, community, tribal, state, federal, and global), our minor will have a priority focus on needs and opportunities for public service in New Mexico.

The overarching goal of this minor is for students to demonstrate an understanding of the evolution of public service and the current critical problems and to develop skills empowering students to be a part of addressing social problems. The School of Public Administration (SPA) is well-positioned to be the center of this work. SPA has been developing public service leaders at the graduate level for over 50 years, and alumni serve in a wide range of public, non-profit, and relevant private sector roles. Through this minor, SPA also aims to support the work happening across UNM to prepare undergraduate students for careers in public service.

Program Description

Introduction

This minor extends the School of Public Administration's mission statement to undergraduate students that will go on to contribute to public, nonprofit, and private organizations that function at all interrelated levels of government around the globe. Students will acquire critical knowledge and skills to help them address ethical, equity, and managerial challenges in a complex and diverse world.

This minor builds capacity in public service for students to address societal challenges and opportunities. Students will investigate the foundations of public administration and will develop competencies in public service by making inter and multidisciplinary connections to and between fields and disciplines.

The minor is a balance of foundational scholarship in public administration and related scholarship from a wide range of disciplines (of which students can choose from electives that complement their specific goals). Academic concepts will be applied through an experiential practicum course.

Mission

The School of Public Administration is the premier school in New Mexico for preparing students with the knowledge and skills for agile, ethical, and effective leadership in public and tribal governance, and healthcare and non-profit sectors. The mission of the Minor in Public Service is to build capacity in students to be the next generation of leaders in addressing social problems by preparing undergraduate students for careers in public service inclusive of majors.

Goals

The overarching goal of this minor is building capacity in students for public service inclusive of all majors. Through the minor, students will:

- Investigate myriad theories informing contemporary public service scholarship;
- Bridge theories to practice through the application of theories to current problems by building specific skills relevant to public service
- Explore specific contexts, including diverse priority populations as well as differences in local, state, national and global needs, and how to adapt as a public servant and leader depending on widely varying situations.
- Be connected to colleagues, mentors, and peers who are committed to public service across academic interests and the public, nonprofit, and private sectors.
