Statements to address budgetary and Faculty Load Implications and Long-range planning * (enter text below or upload a doc/pdf file) Because the changes are related to terminology alignment and Banner codes and do not affect the courses currently being taught, there will be no new implications for budgetary and faculty load or impact on long-range planning.

Reasons for New B.A./B.S.Ed. in Secondary Education Major

There is an urgent need to align the curriculum for undergraduate degrees currently listed as leading to Secondary Education Bachelors programs with the university curricular and Banner systems. The current majors were enacted years ago when content teaching fields (endorsements in the New Mexico licensure system) were implemented. Since 2004, with implementation of the university curriculum terminology alignment project that has instituted academic terms (not state licensure terms), the system can no longer accommodate majors and minors in the same format as before. Likewise the new format can no longer provide access of the programs to students or faculty through reports within the university Banner system.

The proposed alignment language clarifies that there are two degrees (BAED and BSED) with the Degree titles including Secondary Education in the title. The major is clearly secondary education and the concentrations-teaching fields will provide clear visibility of the content areas that will meet licensure requirements for endorsements. The major of secondary education will have a set of common courses from within the program(s) of the Teacher Education Department. The proposed concentrations-teaching fields (see Form C for new Concentrations-Teaching Fields included in this packet)for the secondary education degrees will also be aligned with the university curricular and Banner Systems. The university curriculum terminology system has now expanded the definition of concentration to address teaching fields: "Within undergraduate elementary education and secondary education degree programs, teaching fields are treated as concentrations in order to be tracked by the Banner system."

The proposed major and concentration-teaching fields are changes that will accommodate current university terminology and Banner codes, but will not include any changes in actual course requirements. Requirements for the proposed secondary education major have been in existence for many years under the name of "Professional Education Sequence" on p. 382 of the current catalogue. This section will now have the heading "Secondary Education Major Requirements." Likewise, specific course requirements for the current "Undergraduate Teaching Fields" on p. 381 of the catalog will not change, but have been more completely defined, as per request of the Registrar's Office. The newly aligned terminology for teaching fields will now become "Secondary Education Concentrations – Teaching Field Requirements." K-12 licensure/teaching fields now listed for Secondary Education Teaching Fields will remain in their home programs and not be involved directly in the new concentrations-teaching fields for Secondary Education. These include Visual Arts, Bilingual Education, and TESOL, all of which currently include endorsements within their programs of studies. New Mexico regulations were changed in June 2006 to exclude Bilingual Education and TESOL as primary endorsements for secondary education licensure. Students now must have primary academic teaching fields and may complete K-12 bilingual education or TESOL endorsements as additional teaching credentials. Altogether, these three teaching fields, however, will still be available for secondary students in addition to the required Secondary Education academic concentrations-teaching fields.

Two courses within the long-standing current Professional Education Sequence (see catalog p. 382) will be changed from topics (Special Education 493 and CIMTE 493) to regular classes (SPCD 489 and EDUC 450). A Form B proposal for SPCD 489 has been previously submitted for approval. The Form B for EDUC 450 has been included in the package of Forms that includes this Form C for a new Secondary Education Major. LLSS 482 was deleted from the list of methods courses under the Professional Courses list because it has traditionally been used only for bilingual education or TESOL and will now be taught within the LLSS Bilingual Education and TESOL endorsement programs of studies that will be used as additional teaching credentials rather than required components of the secondary education initial licensure program.

The Secondary Education Program offers an undergraduate major leading to teacher licensure in subjects commonly taught in middle and high schools (grades 7-12). All students must complete application and be admitted prior to beginning the program. Admissions are competitive and limited by capacity to deliver a quality program. Application Deadline: Initial screening of applications begins on April 1 each year. Applications submitted after April 1 will be considered on a space available basis only.

Undergraduate Curriculum for Students Preparing to Teach in Secondary Schools

The curriculum leading to the Bachelor's Degree (B.A. Ed. or B.S. Ed.) in Secondary Education is designed for students preparing to teach in middle schools, junior high schools or senior high schools (grades 7-12). The program of studies for the Secondary Education major and licensure preparation has three components:

- a. General Education Requirements
- b. Concentration-Teaching Field Requirements
- c. Professional Education Requirements

Students should see an Academic Advisor for initial consultation about their program. A Secondary Education Faculty Advisor must approve entry into Secondary Education Professional Education courses.

General Education Requirements (66 hours)

General education requirements include the following disciplines and courses:

Students must achieve a 2.5 overall GPA in General Education courses to qualify for student teaching.

Secondary Education Concentration–Teaching Field Requirements

In New Mexico, teachers must complete one or more teaching fields (endorsements) to apply for a Secondary Teaching License (grades 7-12). The Concentration–Teaching Fields included within the B.A.Ed. and the B.S.Ed. in Secondary Education degrees meet the state teaching field (endorsement) requirements for initial licensure and federal NCLB requirements for Highly Qualified teachers. Students must achieve a 2.5 GPA overall in Concentration-Teaching Field courses in order to qualify for student teaching.

The B.A. Ed. in Secondary Education includes at least one of the following concentration-teaching fields:

Concentration-Teaching Field in Communicative Arts Education (54 hours): This concentration-teaching field includes interdisciplinary study in literature, writing, communication and journalism and theatre arts. Course requirements include the following:

For more information about licenses or endorsements in other programs or colleges within the university, contact the appropriate programs listed below.

Concentration-Teaching Field in Fine Arts-Dance (36 hours): Completion of this concentration-teaching field leads to an endorsement in Fine Arts-Dance. This program is administered by the Secondary Education Program, but students are urged to seek advice early in the program from both the College of Education and the Department of Theatre and Dance. Requirements may change. See the Theatre and Dance advisor for current information.

Current course requirements include the following (at least 12 credit hours at the 300 level or above): DANC 105, 212, 250, 311, 416, 462 or 463, 14 hours of dance technique (8 hours must be in Modern, the other hours must be completed in three of the following areas: Ballet, Ethnic, Folk, Jazz or Tap)

Fine-Arts-Theatre (36 hours): Completion of this concentration-teaching endorsement in Fine Arts-Theatre. This program is administered by the Secondary Education Program, but students are urged to seek advice early in the program from both the College of Education and the Department of Theatre and Dance. Requirements may change. See the Theatre and Dance advisor for current information. Current course requirements include the following (at least 12 credit hours at the 300 level or above); THEA 120, 121, 122, 192, 194, 196, 223, 224, 403, 418 and 419

Visual Art Licensure: The College of Education offers course work towards a Visual Art Licensure K-12. Those interested should see the section on Art Education in this Catalog and contact a program advisor.

Bilingual Education (27 hours): Students may elect to pursue a New Mexico K-12 endorsement in Bilingual Education with a Spanish/English or Navajo/English concentration. However, in order to meet

federal and state requirements for the 7-12 school curriculum, secondary students interested in a bilingual education endorsement must have a first concentration-teaching field in one of the academic content areas such as English/language arts, fine arts-dance or theatre, social studies, mathematics, science, or modern & classical languages listed above in the Secondary Concentration-Teaching Fields section. They may then complete requirements for the bilingual education endorsement as an additional teaching credential. Students must see a Bilingual Education Program advisor in the Department of Language, Literacy and Sociocultural Studies (LLSS) for current information about Bilingual Education Endorsement requirements and approval of entry into Bilingual Education concentration courses.

Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (36 hours): Students may elect to pursue a K-12 endorsement in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). However, in order to meet federal and state requirements for the 7-12 school curriculum, secondary students must have a first concentration-teaching field in one of the academic content areas such as English/language arts, social studies, mathematics, science, or modern & classical languages listed above in the Secondary Concentration-Teaching Fields section. They may then complete requirements for the TESOL endorsement as an additional teaching credential. See a TESOL Program advisor in the Department of LLSS for current information about the TESOL Endorsement requirements and approval of entry in TESOL concentration courses.

Professional Education Requirements (27 hours)

The following professional education sequence is required of all undergraduate students pursuing a secondary education major and eligibility for an initial teaching license for grades 7-12. The two-semester sequence includes consecutive fall and spring semesters of the same academic year (i.e., teaching experiences and related courses). In order to qualify for the professional education sequence, students should complete all general education and concentration-teaching field requirements. However, if space is available and other requirements have been met, students may be allowed with faculty approval to proceed into the professional education sequence if lacking no more than six hours total of all other requirements. Students must achieve a 2.5 GPA in their general education courses, a 2.5 GPA in their concentration-teaching field courses, and a 3.0 overall GPA in their professional education courses to advance to student teaching.

EDUC 362: Teaching Experience I and EDUC 462: Student Teaching require a field experience in a secondary school. In EDUC 362: Teaching Experience I, students spend one period per day, Monday-Friday, in a secondary school classroom with the same teacher and group of students each day. Students in EDUC 362: Teaching Experience I begin their field experience at the beginning of the public school semester, in order to observe and document their cooperating teacher's work in establishing a classroom community and management system. EDUC 462: Student Teaching requires full-time teaching and related

educational responsibilities (all day, Monday-Friday) for one semester. A total of 12 credit hours are required for this experience, which includes EDUC 462: Student Teaching (9 hours) and EDUC 464: Student Teaching Seminar (3 hours). EDUC 462: Student Teaching adheres to the public school calendar at the beginning of the spring semester, but ends in alignment with the conclusion of the UNM spring semester in May.

Students are encouraged to consult the COE Advisement Center early in their college careers to ensure that they finish their program in a timely manner. See introductory information in the College of Education section in this catalog regarding application for licensure following completion of all requirements for the B.A.Ed. or B.S.Ed. in Secondary Education.
